The George Smeath Planning Student Award is a prestigious honor given to a student who has demonstrated exceptional overall performance throughout their studies. Daniel, who was nominated for the award by his professors, didn’t even know he was nominated until he won the award.

A Passion for Urban Planning at the U

During his time at the University of Utah, Daniel did not just focus on his studies—he also took an active role in campus life. As Vice President of the Urbanists student group, he helped the club gain greater traction on campus and in the community.

He also worked alongside Dr. Andy Hong on important research regarding sidewalk conditions and pedestrian safety.

For his capstone project, Daniel collaborated with Sweet Streets Salt Lake City, conducting a quantitative analysis of Salt Lake City’s bicycle facilities and accessibility, with a focus on how comfortable and safe it is for people to reach common destinations.

From the U to Washington, D.C.

After graduating this year, Daniel returned to Washington, D.C., where he now works at Foursquare ITP, focusing on data analysis for multi-modal transportation planning. His role allows him to continue shaping the future of transportation and urban mobility.

SKILLS TO PRIORITIZE AS A PLANNER

Over ten years ago, as a graduate student at the University of Idaho, I worked on a thesis titled “Do we practice what is preached? Exploring the relationship between skills identified by planning theorists and skills used by practicing planners, including an in-depth look at the factors that may influence those skills.” This paper had two main purposes: first, to determine whether the skills practicing planners possess align with those identified by planning theorists, and second, to highlight the attributes (community and personal) that influence the skills planners deem important, possess, use, and seek to improve. Based on my research, I found the top three skills that planners deemed most important were: 1) the ability to work well with others, 2) problem-solving, and 3) a willingness to learn. More than a decade after that research, I have come to better appreciate the wisdom of the planners who assisted in the study. I firmly believe that not only are these the skills we as planners must possess to be successful, but they are also the skills that bring success in any facet of life.
